

Climate change and global warming have always been regarded as the foremost critical global challenge for the 21<sup>st</sup> century. Is global warming real or exaggerated? Is carbon dioxide the primary cause of global warming? What predominantly affect climate change?

He has published 130 scientific papers and seven books for the general public. His latest book "Heaven and earth: Climate change-the missing science" was an international best seller while “A Short History of Planet Earth” won the Eureka prize in 2002. He received a number of awards from different countries and a new phosphate mineral “Plimerite” was named for him in recognition of his contribution to ore geology.

Professor Wyss Yim, DSc (London), PhD (Tasmania), DIC, CGeol, FGS, MHKIE, FHKMetS, has been teaching in the University for over 30 years. He was the Deputy Chairman and Member, Climate Change Science Implementation Team, United Nations’ International Year of Planet Earth 2007-2009 and President, Sub-commission on Continental Shelves, International Union for Quaternary Research 2003-2007. He has indepth research on Hong Kong climate and has over 400 publications.
